Natural Areas Stewardship Update

A few weeks ago staff and volunteers at Friedrich Wilderness Park were treated to a prolonged visit by a polyphemus moth (*Antheraea polyphemus;* Cramer). A large and stunningly beautiful moth, its common name is inspired by the giant Cyclops of Greek mythology who had a single eye in the middle of his forehead. The polyphemus moth has large eyespots (not true eyes) in the middle of its hindwings. By the way, the polyphemus moth is a member of the family Saturniidae, so named because the eyespots of some members of the family contain concentric rings reminiscent of the planet Saturn (Powell, 2003).

Another striking feature of the polyphemus moth is its antennae; they are "quadripectinate (comb-like on four sides), with those of males being larger than those of females" (see <u>this website</u> packed with delightfully detailed text and photos related to the polyphemus moth).

Birdwatching in the Natural Areas

Staff and patrons report hearing and/or seeing the following birds at Crownridge Canyon Natural Area and/or Friedrich Park: Golden-cheeked warbler, Black and white warbler, Audubon's oriole, Spotted towhee, Whiteeyed vireo, Hutton's vireo, Blue-gray gnatcatcher, Hermit thrush, Black-bellied whistling duck, and Rufouscrowned sparrow.

To have the best chance at observing birds, get out early, bring binoculars, be quiet, and, of course, be patient. Many birders use <u>eBird</u> for the latest information on species being observed. Natural Areas staff reminds all to follow the rules of ethical birding. The federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act and the Endangered Species Act specifically prohibit the taking or killing of migratory and endangered birds, respectively.

The word "take" includes harassing and pursuing, and, when applied to birds, is interpreted to include such activities as "pishing," playing owl calls, and playing any recording (including "apps") for the purpose of eliciting a response from a migratory and/or endangered bird.

The Natural Areas appreciates the educational value of apps, tapes, and other audible recordings; however, the staff reminds you that if you choose to play audible recordings, please use headphones, earbuds, or other personal listening devices so that only you (and not the birds) hear the calls. When a bird responds to a humanly generated call, the bird is diverted away from its usual activities. This means the bird is responding to a person, rather than attending to its own needs of feeding, nesting, raising young, defending a territory, etc. Remember that how you bird can affect the very species you came to enjoy.

As stated in the American Birding Association Principles of Birding Ethics, "In any conflict of interest between birds and birders, the welfare of the birds and their environment comes first."

Who are the FSANA Board of Directors?

The Board of Directors of the Friends of San Antonio Natural Areas is a volunteer governing body that meets in support of FSANA's mission. The Board's recent accomplishments include:

- Providing bus reimbursements allowing Title 1 schools to visit Friedrich Wilderness Park;
- Providing funds for Second Saturday educational programs on topics such as bees, geology, reptiles, native plants, and birds;

Partnering with Texas Parks & Wildlife to obtain a grant for the construction of new trails at Friedrich Wilderness Park;

- Obtaining a Partners for Fish and Wildlife grant from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service for habitat restoration;
- Participating in the Monarch festival at the Pearl Brewery; and
- Ensuring that development in proximity to the Natural Areas is in compliance with city ordinances related to zoning, preservation of trees, water conservation, lighting, and noise pollution.
