
#### **Protect Texas Trees**

On Wednesday, July 26, 2017, the Texas Senate passed <u>Senate Bill 14</u> that would ban local tree ordinances. A couple of weeks ago, we notified you of the importance of this legislation for our environment.

The <u>Rivard Report</u> notes the many benefits of trees and their importance to our community. San Antonio has a <u>Tree Preservation Ordinance</u> that was established in 1997, and in 2010 established mitigation fees that would encourage homeowners to preserve trees. The current session of the Texas Legislature may revoke local municipalities' right to enforce local city tree ordinances.

## San Antonio Parks and Recreation Natural Areas Stewardship Activities August 2017

Likely you already know that there will be a solar eclipse on August 21, 2017, and that everyone in North America plus parts of South America, Africa, and Europe will see (weather permitting) at least a partial solar eclipse. There is a <u>narrow band within the United States</u> where the total eclipse will be visible

As an interesting twist, a recent episode of the radio program "A Way with Words" featured some of the terms you will be hearing frequently in reference to the eclipse. For example, during a full solar eclipse people talk about the corona, the sun's outermost atmosphere. According to "A Way with Words," the term corona comes from the Latin word that means "crown" or "garland." Corona is also "the source of *coronation*, as well as the *coronary* arteries that wreathe the human heart, and *coroner*, originally an officer of the Crown." Think about that—a coroner is someone who is called when there is a death—how deathlike it can seem when the light of the sun is blocked by the shadow of the moon. According to A Way with Words, "another eclipse-related term, *penumbra*, comes from the Latin for "almost shadow," and refers to the shadow cast by the earth or moon over an area where a partial eclipse is visible. Interestingly, a related word, umbrage, means "a sense of offense or resentment." There it is, umbrage, another word with dark connotations.

Here's hoping that in August we will all have a little more darkness—in the form of shade! Below is our schedule, with exact locations to be determined as management needs dictate. You must

## **Viewing the Eclipse in San Antonio**

Although the path of totality of "Great American Eclipse" bisects the country from Oregon to South Carolina, San Antonio will experience a partial eclipse on August 21, 2017. The last total eclipse visible in the continental United States occurred in 1979 and the next one occurs in 2024.

- The <u>Scobee Education Center</u> will host a series of activities in the middle of the day to
  celebrate and educate for this unique event. 1,000 special solar filter glasses have been
  purchased to distribute while supplies last. Members of the San Antonio College
  community have been invited to sponsor activities during this event, so the event is
