Native Plants Blooming in the Parks

On your next visit to Friedrich Wilderness Park, take a moment at the entrance to admire the bright red stand of tubular flowers on a spike, Standing Cypress. This biennial plant, *Ipomopsis rubra*, is also known by the common names Texas Plume, Scarlet Gilia & Red Texas Star. The plant can grow up to six feet tall and is native to south-eastern United States, as it is drought tolerant and can survive in many soil types. The flowers also benefit pollinators, as they attract butterflies and hummingbirds.

No Animals in the Natural Areas

If you hike in Friedrich Wilderness Park or Crownridge Canyon Natural Area, you will notice signs to indicate that pets are not allowed. These are habitats for wildlife and no animals are permitted in these natural areas, *including service or support animals*.

We often have questions about allowing pets into the Natural Areas. Most San Antonio Parks including Hardberger and Eisenhower Parks allow dogs and even provide (at no cost) bags for people to use to pick up dog waste. PLEASE pick up the bags and deposit them in the waste containers provided.

When dogs are present in recreational trails, studies have found that several wildlife species will change the way they use that habitat. In fact, trails correlated with altered patterns of habitat utilization by several species. Mammals, birds, reptiles, insects, and other wildlife react to the sound, scent, and/or sight of dogs, leashed or not. Thus, wildlife disturbed has diminished energy available for breeding, finding food, raising young, etc.

- Bird nesting areas, especially those of ground nesting birds, are disturbed by dogs and sensitive wildlife habitat is damaged.
- When dogs urinate in nesting and sensitive wildlife habitats to "mark" their territory, it becomes undesirable or uninhabitable to the wildlife living there.
- Seeds are picked up by dog fur and paws pick up seeds, which can spread invasive plant species.
- · Unleashed dogs can chase and injure (or even kill) squirrels, birds, and other wildlife.

Observe <u>National Trails Day</u> on June 2, the first Saturday of June. The trails provide access to natural areas for hiking, bird watching, and more.
