Migrating Monarchs

The migration path of monarch butterflies stretches from Canada to Mexico, and is a cause for wonder and awe. Declines in the eastern population of these butterflies have drawn attention to the negative effects of herbicides and environmental degradation. Monarchs lay their eggs on milkweed as they migrate north from Mexico in the spring and summer. Hence, emphasis has been placed on planting milkweed, the preferred food source for monarch larvae. However, studies indicate that milkweed abundance may not be the limiting factor for monarchs. <u>Recent research</u> at Cornell University suggests that attention should be paid to the needs that the butterflies have at each stage of their life cycle. For example, in the fall as they migrate south, <u>adult monarchs need water, food, and protected roosting sites</u>. Thus, in fall, Texas flowering plants become especially important fuel sources for monarchs on their migratory journey to Mexico.

Special Note: Our parks participate in biannual <u>butterfly counts</u> that are conducted in the spring and fall. These counts are used to monitor butterfly populations, and are submitted to the North American Butterfly Association, the same group that provided data cited in the Cornell University study.
