## Mushrooms in the parks

The heavy rains in San Antonio over the past month are good not only for the garden but also provide an opportunity to see mushrooms, or fungi, in wooded areas. Mushrooms you may find around San Antonio are different from the common button mushrooms found at the grocery store; mushrooms in our area come in a diversity of shapes and sizes. Regardless of their appearance, mushrooms play an important role in the decomposition of plants and animals. The structures we see above ground or growing on logs are only the "tip of the iceberg" while the bulk of the mushrooms consist of a large network of threadlike mycelia below ground. This network in the soil or wood is composed of minute hyphae that are invisible to the naked eye and secrete enzymes that break down plant and animal organic matter into minerals and small molecules, which then becomes available as recycled nutrients for new plants. If it were not for the fungi's ability to break down the lignin and cellulose of the leaves and dead trees in the forest, the dead material would pile up and affect the natural environment. Mushrooms are increasingly recognized for their economic importance as they can also break down some plastics and hydrocarbons. Other fungi that are beneficial to us in our daily lives are the antibiotic penicillin, and yeast that we use to make bread, beer, and wine. While we can consume fungi, please note that there are many types of edible mushrooms in Texas that may be easily mistaken for poisonous species, so it is best to ask a trained mycologist or consult a mycology society before eating wild mushrooms
