Golden-Cheeked Warblers: Saving Woodlands

One of the main attractions of Friedrich Wilderness Park and Crownridge Canyon is that they provide breeding habitat for the endangered golden-cheeked warbler, Setophaga chrysoparia. These tiny songbirds arrive here in late February or early March and may begin leaving for Mexico and Central America in July. Unfortunately, as San Antonio has grown, a significant percentage of the warbler's habitat has been taken over by housing and retail developments. It was recommended that the species be removed from the endangered species list in 2015 as a result of <u>studies</u> that have since been shown to have conflicting data. The conflicts were caused by differences in sampling and data analysis methods. However, in February 2019, the <u>Express News</u> reported that because of a recent court hearing, the golden-cheeked warbler's habitat will <u>remain</u> under the protection of the federal Endangered Species Act.

Golden-cheeked warblers need closed canopy woodlands in which to breed. The bark of the Ashe juniper, or mountain cedar, is used by the birds to build their nests in junipers, oaks, and deciduous trees. Recognized by a yellow face, a black (male) or greenish (female) crown and back, and two white wing bars, the birds feed on insects and spiders and usually lay 3-4 eggs. The small birds are most often <u>detected by their songs</u> rather than by being seen. Golden-cheeked warblers have at least two distinctly different songs, sometimes referred to as the A song and the B song. Moreover, they sing variations of the B song.

Every golden-cheeked warbler was born in Central Texas, the only place in the world where these birds breed. No wonder bird watchers from all over the globe come here to see these warblers! So take a slow walk in Friedrich Wilderness Park or Crownridge Canyon and listen and look for these wondrous birds. When you see or hear one, remember that they are helping save green spaces.
