What (or Who) Is in a Name?

Plant names can be confusing. The common names can vary from book to book and may be based on the name of the first person who observed the plant, the shape of the fruit, the color of the flower, or any number of other characteristics. However, no matter how many different common names there are, the scientific (Latin) name is always the same for any one organism. For instance, Indian blanket, firewheel, and sundance are all common names for the same plant. We can be grateful to Carolus Linnaeus for the system of Latin names used to identify plants (and animals). The first part, Gaillardia, refers to the genus, while puchella is the species that identifies the specific flower commonly called Indian blanket, firewheel or sundance. Interestingly, Carolus Linnaeus was actually born Carl Linnaeus, but used Carolus, the Latin version of Carl, in his books <http://unsm-ento.unl.edu/workers/CLinnaeus.htm>.

[Ferdinand Jacob Lindheimer \(1801-1879\)](#) is another person for whom we Texans can be particularly grateful. Born and educated in Germany, Lindheimer immigrated to the United States in 1836 and settled in [New Braunfels](#) where he wrote for the local newspaper and continued his passionate study of natural history and plants. Known as "the father of Texas botany because of his work as the first [permanent-resident plant collector in Texas](#)", there are [48 plants that bear the name of Lindheimer](#). One of those plants is blooming now, the Lindheimer daisy, also known as Texas Yellowstar, Texas Star, and Texas Yellow-star. Its Latin name, [Lindheimera texana](#), was assigned by A. Gray & Engelman, both of whom were prominent American botanists. Some of the common plants that were first identified by Lindheimer that we should look for in our parks are the Texas prickly pear (*Opuntia lindheimeri*), white gaura (*Oenothera lindheimeri*), Texas yellow star, and devil's shoestring (*Nolina lindheimeriana*).
